Cleage sets Flyin' West in 1898, more than twenty years after Benjamin "Pap" Singleton, an African-American preacher working as an undertaker in Nashville, Tennessee, started hearing the troubles of black men and women who did not have a place to live because they could not afford the rent demanded by the white men they worked for, their former slave-owners.
