Implement Dynamic Restorative Nursing Programs with Confidence. The risk for ADL decline in long-term care residents is a serious issue that often leads to falls, pressure ulcers, weight loss, depression, and other negative outcomes. To ensure quality outcomes and to comply with federal regulation, nursing facilities must have a comprehensive and effective restorative program that encourages each resident’s highest level of function.

### Guide to Successful Restorative Programs

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, in the Long-Term Care Facility Resident Assessment Instrument 3.0 User’s Manual, defines a restorative nursing program as “nursing interventions that promote the resident’s ability to adapt and adjust to living as independently and safely as possible.” This approach supports the person’s achievement and maintenance of optimal physical, mental, and psychosocial functioning daily.

### Restorative Nursing Looks at Possibilities to Improve ...

Restorative programming includes nursing interventions and must be overseen by a licensed nurse. While CMS does not require a formal training or certification for restorative nurses, there may be state requirements. However, it is essential that the nurses overseeing the restorative program have the competency required for this position.
